Robert C. (Bob) Futer, 83, went to be home with the Lord peacefully on February 6, 2018 surrounded by his family where he had been residing at Brightview Woodbury Lake in Woodbury, NJ. He was the son of Cecil M. and Gertrude (Baker) Futer. Bob attended Bridgeton schools having graduated in 1951. He attended the then West Chester College with a B.A. in Elementary Music.

After two years in the Army, Bob was hired by Seabrook Schools as music teacher and taught there for 35 years. He furthered his education by receiving a Master's Degree in 1971. For a number of years he also taught at for a short time at Gloucester County College and 20 years at Cumberland County College. In 1982 he was given the honor of directing the S.J. Junior High Chorus that was held in Bridgeton High School

Many singers were blessed and challenged to perform under the leadership of Mr. Futer. Starting at age 17, he began directing church choirs, many local in this area, and other organizations for the worship of God. He even directed two church choirs on the very same Sunday. He also started a Community Chorus in the Bridgeton area for local singers to enjoy and led a Madrigal singing group at the Bridgeton Renaissance Faire. Bob had a beautiful tenor/baritone singing voice that he used for church, parties, and weddings. His favorite solo was "The Holy City." He also had the privilege to direct a three octave hand bell choir. Bob truly had a long and wonderful musical life.

Bob is survived by his daughter, Kathryn F. Ackley (Kenny) and son, William H. Futer. Bob was formerly married to Jean (Wells) Futer for 34 years.

All services will be held at the New Hope Presbyterian Church, 65 Hitchner Ave., Bridgeton, NJ 08302. The viewing will be held Monday night, February 12, 2018, from 6

until 8 PM and again Tuesday morning, February 13, 2018, from 10 until 11 AM. A Service will follow the Tuesday morning visitation at 11 AM. Inurnment at Hephsula Baptist Church Cemetery in PA will take place at a later date. His animated facial expressions, dramatic waving hands, and exacerbated shoulder shrugging were his cartoonish signature moves to not only accentuated his passion for music, but also his deep rooted desire to inspire his students. What he did in class was funny, interesting, and inclusive for every student.
